# Caldwell Family Fund helps strengthen region Impact grows as fifth generation learns about community needs

For five generations, the Caldwell family has taken solace in the **Star Lake** area, continuing a decades-long tradition that began when their grandfather, **Joseph Caldwell**, purchased a log cabin around the turn of the 20th century.

Joseph Caldwell owned J.S. Caldwell Lumber, a Syracusebased firm that did business in the Adirondacks. He became very involved in the Star Lake community and gifted some of the property for the hospital there. Through the years, the cabin has become a favorite family retreat, serving initially as a hunting camp and even a honeymoon destination.

For Joseph Caldwell's grandchildren, **Fred**, **Jeff**, and **Mimi Weber**, the camp is where they learned to fish and sail and experienced their first overnight campouts.

Many members of the succeeding generations have experienced the same rights of passage.

"It became the happy place for five generations," said **Jeff Weber**, who, with his wife, **Linda**, is retired and lives in Guilford, Conn. "As a kid, I remember this area when it was a lot more prosperous. It was a very active place when I was growing up and spending time here."

The family has witnessed community needs across the region evolve over time as the paper, timber, and mining industries have all but retreated from the Clifton-Fine area. That led the family to "do something that we feel can make a difference where it's needed most," Jeff said.

In 2020, the family established the **Caldwell Family Fund** at the **Northern New York Community Foundation**, a permanent charitable resource to support and enhance the quality of life in the Clifton-Fine region. The Fund is designed to help augment annual support available through the **Clifton-Fine Community Fund** at the Community Foundation.

Because of their multi-generational ties to Star Lake, the family's support for programs and projects benefiting the hamlet has been greatest to date.

In 2021, the fund supported

The **Clifton-Fine Community Fund** was established in 2013 as a geographicspecific fund to support efforts that strengthen the quality of life in the southeast St. Lawrence County towns and hamlets of Fine, Oswegatchie, Star Lake, Newton Falls, Wanakena and Cranberry Lake. The Northern New York Community Foundation stewards this charitable fund. To build initial support, the Foundation awarded a \$50,000 challenge grant to donors interested in giving to this philanthropic resource. By the end of 2014, people from across the region came together to create a \$100,000 community fund. It awards grants to support local projects and nonprofit organizations that serve the region in perpetuity. Families from across the region can now give to support the places they love and call home, forever.

## **Clifton-Fine Community Fund donors help** strengthen region through giving, grantmaking

Since it began awarding grants in 2014 to help strengthen the quality of life for residents in the Clifton-Fine region of southeast St. Lawrence County, the Clifton-Fine Community Fund has provided nearly \$50,000 in support to help with 45 projects and initiatives.

From essential needs to health and wellness, history, education and libraries and arts and culture, the Community Fund has broadly supported efforts to improve life for all in the towns and hamlets of **Fine**, **Oswegatchie**, **Star Lake**, **Newton Falls**, **Wanakena** and **Cranberry Lake**.

In 2022, the Community Fund awarded five grants totaling \$5,820. Grant funding was awarded to help the **Cultural Arts Committee** complete a sustainable dock in **Wanakena** for community use; to support the **Clifton-Fine Lions Club's** purchase of 21 new high-definition televisions for **Clifton-Fine Hospital** and its extended care facility; to aid the **Cranberry Lake North Shore Hub** with installation of a concrete pad alongside its building to host events, concerts, lectures, and additional outdoor use by the community; and to help the **Clifton Community Library** acquire activity kit backpacks for visitors to enjoy.

The Community Fund is a **Northern New York Community Foundation** affiliate. Its core functions of reviewing requests for grant funding and making grant awards are accomplished through an all-volunteer committee with guidance from Community Foundation staff.

Annually, the Community Fund issues a call to nonprofit and municipal organizations for requests for grants. It receives proposals ranging from \$250 to \$5,000 for a wide range of worthy and important projects.

The committee reviews applications in late summer each year and grants are made after Community Foundation board action in late September. To apply, organizations must either be a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, or the project must be stewarded by a municipal organization serving as a fiscal sponsor. Previously completed projects cannot be funded.

essential needs through a grant to the Star Lake Food Pantry. Last year, the family awarded a grant to the Wilderness Health Care Foundation to help fund training for home health aides. This year, a grant to the Free Community Meal at St. Hubert's Church will help acquire a commercial dishwasher to support a more than 20-year, all-volunteer program serving the region's residents.

"We're bringing the family into it and growing our giving and expanding how we can help a community that generations have loved," Jeff said.

Chris Jones, a great-grandson of Joseph Caldwell, lives in Jamesville and has quickly engaged with the fund. He said it has "sensitized a new generation on what the needs

are" and the many ways they can make a meaningful impact.

Chris credits the Community Foundation and its team for helping his family deepen their impact in the Clifton-Fine area.

"Having a great team to work with helps us understand the needs in the community," Chris said. "We look for whatever small ways we can help."

For Jeff, Chris, and the family, the fund has given them "a way to help show our kids the value of philanthropy, that it's important to find ways to give back and gratifying to do so in an area you love."

"We hope it will continue to grow and make a bigger impact," Jeff said. "Our children are now involved and they're teaching the next generations about community and how they can make a difference."

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## Foundation matching gifts to Preservation and Vibrancy Fund

Community Foundation matching grant will double gifts to the Wanakena Preservation and Vibrancy Fund, a new charitable resource that helps community betterment efforts in the historic hamlet.

The fund was established in 2020 after Stephen Moyer and Lester Allen, longtime supporters of the Foundation's work in the region, were seeking a lasting way to assist nonprofits that serve Wanakena residents. Mr. Moyer and Mr. Allen strongly believe in the charitable spirit living in the community. The two donors want to challenge supporters to help build a permanent, geographic-specific resource for the area.

After an initial gift, Mr. Moyer and Mr. Allen agreed to match each additional gift, dollar-for-dollar, up to \$15,000 to help build the fund. Once the match is complete, the Community Foundation will make an additional \$10.000 commitment to the fund.

The Wanakena Historical Association is helping to promote the matching opportunity. Along with its mission to preserve and feature local history, the Historical Association also supports a variety of local community projects.

The fund will have the ability, from time to time, to help support the mission and work of nonprofit organizations serving the Wanakena community while preserving the community's past, present, and future by providing ongoing, meaningful and lasting support.

In the spirit of this fund, and given the interests of the original donors, the fund may support projects and efforts centered on history and historical preservation, arts and culture, recreation, the environment, community beautification, and more.
