# 2024 Canstruction for Northern New York

The **LEAD Council** of the Northern New York Community Foundation invites students at local schools and those participating in student groups to create a "Canstruction" project to help combat food insecurity in their community and across the North Country.

This group activity encourages students to use their creativity and construct a project made of collected canned food, other nonperishable food items, and hygiene products that will support a local food pantry or backpack program of their choice. It's a fun and competitive effort with an opportunity to win a prize and help your community.

## **Project Guidelines**

As you design and build your Canstruction project, please follow these project guidelines:

- Each sculpture must be made entirely of unopened, commercially available cans of food. Hygiene products (toothpaste, soap, shampoo, etc.) are also eligible for use.
- The cans used must be standard sized (approximately 10 to 15 ounces) and cannot be dented, damaged, or expired.
- The sculptures may be no larger than 10 feet high by 10 feet wide by 10 feet long.
- The design and construction of the sculpture must be structurally sound and stable.
- The sculpture must be able to be deconstructed and all of the cans used must be donated to the local food pantry or backpack program noted on your registration form.
- Each team is responsible for collecting and transporting the cans to the competition site and to their recipient.
- Each team is also responsible to raise money to cover the cost of the cans and any other materials needed to construct their sculpture.
- All sculptures must adhere to local fire and safety codes.
- The sculptures must be designed and built within a specified time frame. Canstruction for Northern New York submissions are due by Friday, April 5th.
- An official form for your completed project will be provided ahead of the submission deadline.
- Overall, the project goal is to raise awareness about hunger and food insecurity, while also providing a fun and creative way for teams to give back to their communities.

#### **Awards**

Three opportunities to win \$500 to be directed toward the local nonprofit organization of your choice: Top Collection Award (most items collected); Best Design Award; People's Choice Award (voting to be conducted online).
