Foundation support helps modernize Lewis County General Hospital

Grant commitment ensures strong future for rural health care

ommunity Foundation grant funding totaling \$175,000 recently helped modernize and expand the 93-year-old **Lewis County General Hospital** in Lowville into a patient-centered facility that will serve Lewis County residents for years to come.

The Community Foundation's Board of Directors approved a grant for the **Lewis County Hospital Foundation** to support the hospital's capital project, which was completed earlier this year.

A grant of \$125,000 was directed toward the "Honoring the Legacy, Building the Future" campaign. The total grant award includes a \$50,000 commitment to the **Lewis** **County Hospital Foundation Endowment Fund** at the Community Foundation.



"The Community Foundation's commitment to and support of our capital campaign validated, inspired, and served as a catalyst for the 'Honoring the Legacy, Building the Future Capital Campaign," **Gerald Cayer**, Lewis County Health System chief executive officer, said.

The \$33 million project included a new 26,000-square-foot surgical pavilion and renovation of the medical, surgical, and critical care units on the hospital's main campus off North State Street in Lowville.

The project transformed medical and surgical services to help meet the community's current and future health care needs. It also positioned it to more easily attract, recruit and retain medical and clinical professionals to Lewis County.

"We are extremely grateful for the generosity of the Community Foundation. Its lead gift for our capital campaign supported a project that will improve health care for our rural community for generations to come," **JoAnne Rhubart**, Lewis County Hospital Foundation executive director said.

"I am extremely grateful and humbled to stand with the Community Foundation, an organization whose commitment and service to Northern New York, just as the Lewis County Health System, began in 1929, evolving into a mission-driven commitment to service, giving, and community."

Foundation's LEAD Council celebrates a **decade of community engagement**, **impact**

The Community Foundation believes in inspiring young professionals across the region to be philanthropic in the communities where they live, work, and play.

The **LEAD Council** was chartered in 2014 as an advisory committee of the Community Foundation empowered to identify and address strategic needs in Jefferson, Lewis, and St. Lawrence counties. The Council is comprised of 22 young professionals who reside and work in the tri-county area with an interest in enhancing the quality of life in the North Country.

The LEAD acronym reflects four important principals of the council's work: Leadership, Engagement, Access, and Direction.

Council members serve as strategic grantmakers and make a proactive difference in the region. Members gain

Partnership delivers flood relief Together with Dyson Foundation, grant aids Lewis residents

\$20,000 grant, in partnership with the **Dyson Foundation**, is helping **Snow Belt Housing Company** provide emergency relief to Lewis County residents impacted by summer flooding. The Community Foundation and the Dyson Foundation each provided \$10,000 to aid with losses.

"Snow Belt Housing is grateful to the Community Foundation and the Dyson Foundation for awarding this grant funding. This support will make a significant impact on our community by helping our neighbors recover and rebuild in the wake of such devastating events," said **Jaylyn Heames**, Snow Belt Housing Company executive director.

Snow Belt Housing Company was recently awarded state grant funding to support homeowners with emergency repairs to make their homes safe, sanitary, and habitable. Extreme weather not only caused tens of thousands of dollars in property damage, but many families also reported the loss of essential personal property, which is not covered under any funding source, leaving many to rebuild without financial help.

Lowville-based Snow Belt Housing facilitates access to safe and affordable housing for low- and moderate-income residents, and partners with others to catalyze community revitalization in Lewis County.

The Community Foundation and the Dyson Foundation are longtime collaborative funding partners. The Dyson Foundation is the primary funder for the annual **"Operation Snowstorm"** initiative that helps provide warm winter clothing for **Lowville** and **Beaver River** students. "Family connections in the Lowville area have provided a reason and an opportunity for the Dyson Foundation to partner with the Community Foundation on this and other important and timely supports for families in need," Dyson Foundation President and CEO **Andrea Reynolds** said. "We are grateful to our partners in the region for their local knowledge and for the real impact that partnership brings to helping meet community needs."

The Dyson Foundation, Millbrook, supports nonprofits and transformative projects in the Mid-Hudson Valley region to improve quality of life, create opportunities for the economically disadvantaged, and strengthen nonprofits. It also provides quality-of-life support in the greater Lowville area, through its invitation-only Legacy and Family Interest grantmaking program.

Continuing a warm winter for children

A Community Foundation partnership that helps provide winter clothing to children at two Lewis County schools will continue to make a big difference for another three years. The collaboration with the Dyson Foundation called "Operation Snowstorm" supplies Lowville Academy and Beaver River students with essential winter garments. This fall, and in 2025 and 2026, the two schools will evenly share an annual grant to support Lewis County youth and families. **Operation Snowstorm** is now in its 18th year at Lowville Academy and its 13th year at Beaver River. The program helps nearly 200 Lewis County students annually. Since 2007, more than \$160.000 has been provided.

Scholarship honors a life of perseverance Henry 'Tyke' Wood was a great example to others of compassion and empathy

Henry "Tyke" Wood was always willing to help others when they needed it. His compassion and empathy were authentic and he cared deeply for his family and friends. It was always easy and natural for Tyke to help someone in need.

THE ADVISOR'S PERSPECTIVE

Why should I protect my wishes in a will?

I n New York State, if you pass away without a will, the law provides that assets titled solely to you will pass "through" your estate. Assets that are titled jointly with others with a right of survivorship, such as my home owned with my spouse and my joint bank account with a named beneficiary, pass "around" your estate.

If you pass away without a will, the law provides that your assets that are going "through" your estate will pass to your "next of kin." For example, the assets of an individual survived by a spouse and two children would pass as follows:

The first \$50,000 to your surviving spouse and half of the balance to your surviving spouse and a quarter to each of your surviving children. Someone would then be appointed to handle the assets that would pass to any beneficiary who is under the age of 18 and/or who is incompetent to handle his or her own assets.

A reason to have a will is to accomplish a different result. What result would you like to accomplish?

Most people want to provide for loved ones who depend on us. Even if we have no "dependents," we want to provide for those who we love and/or "causes" about which we care deeply.

Some people are ready, willing, and able to contribute for the benefit of those who they do not know. They want to promote "good" in the world and to include "strangers" as beneficiaries. Those who are fortunate to be in a position to leave assets to others often select a nonprofit or not-for-profit charitable organization to carry out their intentions.

The Northern New York Community Foundation is a valuable resource for those who wish to



have someone manage their assets in a manner to maximize the return on investments, both in terms of the financial return on their investments and the ability to be flexible as needs of our community may change.

For example, I may want to assist a charity such as a local library, a rescue and ambulance squad, or animal shelter, but after my death things change such that the charity has an excess of resources or, unfortunately, and more likely, the charity has closed its doors. Leaving the Community Foundation with discretion to meet unforeseen changes with a sensibility as to what your values are, i.e., how you would like to direct your assistance if you were able to do so, may make good sense.

If I learned that I have an illness such that I likely will not survive more than a few months, I would like to have my assets restructured so that all of my assets pass "around" my estate, and I "avoid probate."



Leaving the Community Foundation with discretion to meet unforeseen changes with a sensibility as to what your values are, i.e., how you would like to direct your assistance if you were able to do so, may make good sense.

I often suggest to clients the analytical framework of

- What do I want?
- How do I get what I want?

■ Do I wish to avoid probate expenses? Perhaps I should re-title my assets?

Do I wish to provide anything for my grandchildren?

• Are there particular "causes" or people who I would like to assist?

Do I wish to avoid nursing home expenses? Perhaps I should purchase long term health insurance or establish an irrevocable living trust?

After I have passed away, for what will I be remembered?

You should know that each state has different laws. If I should relocate from New York State to Florida, I should retain an attorney licensed to practice law in Florida to review my estate planning.

Organization directors and coaches instill principles of character, courage, and leadership as part of the playing experience.



Grant support lights Little League Foundation joins local businessman to help with Rand Field project

www atertown American Little League will play under the lights at its home field next year, thanks in part to \$10,000 in Community Foundation support.

The grant, which includes \$2,000 from the **DeWitt C. Middleton Fund** at the Foundation, will support a field lighting project at **Rand Field** off Main Street in Watertown.

The Watertown American Little League has operated with the mission to promote character, courage, and leadership to the youth of the

greater Watertown area through the game of baseball. To do so, it has relied on generous financial support from the community.

The organization decided to pursue field lighting to extend playing time at Rand Field and eliminate the need to rent space at other fields in the city because there wasn't enough time available for teams at the league-owned field. Community Foundation partner Jake Johnson and his company have agreed to help with lighting construction and costs, providing \$10,000 toward the total budget of \$20,000.

The Community Foundation is a longtime league supporter. Since 2002, grants totaling \$17,000 to improve Rand Field have been awarded.
