YOUR GIFTS STRENGTHEN RURAL HEALTH CARE



A permanent promise for the River: How endowment strengthens care for generations

River Hospital's future grew even stronger this year when a transformational \$2 million gift was placed into its permanent endowment fund at the Community Foundation. For hospital leaders, the decision reflects a clear belief: long-term stability is essential to sustaining high-quality rural healthcare.

River Hospital established its endowment fund in 2014. In 2021, hospital leadership partnered with the Foundation on a campaign to help strengthen the endowment with the Foundation providing a \$150,000 matching commitment.

Chief Executive Officer **Kelley Tiernan** describes endowment as both a practical tool and a promise.

"Rural healthcare is built on resilience, innovation, and the belief that every person deserves exceptional care close to home," she said. "Our endowment embodies that promise. It strengthens care today and ensures that, no matter what challenges come our way, River Hospital will be here with strength, readiness, and hope for generations to come."

That strength has already made a difference. Endowment support

recently funded an automatic chest compressor now in use during cardiac emergencies, a lifesaving investment many rural hospitals often struggle to make.

The endowment also reflects the vision of donors like Wayne

Strauss, whose leadership gift was intentionally directed to secure River Hospital's long-term future. His commitment inspired others to invest, helping grow a fund designed to serve the community in perpetuity.

Andy Impaglia, CFO, said the hospital's partnership with the Community Foundation brings confidence and stewardship to that vision.

For Executive Director of Development **Stephanie Weiss**, the endowment also reflects the belief of the community in the hospital.

"This endowment is being built one act of generosity at a time," she said. "Every gift is a vote of confidence in our mission and a promise that exceptional care will always be here on the River."

Hospital leaders see the endowment fund as essential to meeting the challenges of rural healthcare, providing stability, fueling innovation, and giving donors a meaningful way to create lasting impact.

"If your mission matters to your community," Ms. Tiernan said, "an endowment is one of the strongest commitments you can make to ensuring it endures." LEADERSHIP ON

Endowment funds critical equipment

River Hospital's growing endowment plays a

vital role in ensuring it

can respond quickly to emerging needs and invest in lifesaving patient technologies. The hospital recently relied on proceeds from its endowment for the first time to purchase an automatic chest compressor, a critical device that allows care teams to deliver uninterrupted, effective CPR during medical emergencies. This single investment demonstrates how the endowment strengthens the hospital's ability to provide exceptional care today, while preserving resources to protect the health of the community

From its start in 1999, the Center understood that independence mattered. Its research needed to stand apart from politics, agendas, and outside influence. Creating an endowment was a deliberate step to safeguard that independence and secure the resources required for rigorous, community-based research.

annual community surveys.

The fund supports the Center's greatest asset: its people. Each year, student researchers conduct interviews, analyze data, and gain real-world experience while contributing to regional projects that shape economic development and quality of life across Jefferson, Lewis, Oswego, and St. Lawrence counties.

"As costs rise, the endowment ensures that the Center remains a stable, reliable resource for the region," said Joel LaLone, executive director of the Center. "Our partnership with the Community Foundation is both natural and essential. We share a mission to strengthen communities and improve quality of life through education, engagement,

and trusted information."

The Center is the only public opinion research institute operated by a community college in the United States, a distinction made possible through deep partnerships. Jefferson Community College provides operational support, while the Community Foundation's stewardship of the endowment sustains long-term capacity and preserves the Center's independence.

The endowment has helped to expand the Center's sustainability and position it to meet growing

demand for timely, reliable data that guides local governments, nonprofits, and businesses.

Mr. LaLone hopes others see the value in investing for the long term.

"Endowments allow important work to continue long after individual projects end. Every gift strengthens students, strengthens communities, and strengthens the region," Mr. LaLone said.

Family's journey inspires new scholarship

Nilie and Rose Richardson believed in education as a 'path to possibility'

ilie and Rose Richardson believed deeply in the power of education. Though their own schooling was limited, they worked tirelessly to ensure their five children had opportunities they never did. Their message was constant and clear: Earn an education. Learn a profession. Build an independent, productive life. They were, as their children describe, "the wind beneath our wings."

Curtis, Calvin, Ellen, Virginia, and Cody Richardson graduated from Ogdensburg Free Academy, an achievement their parents celebrated as one of their life's greatest rewards. Earlier this year, Dr. Curtis Richardson, Ellen Weir, Virginia Wescott, and Cody Richardson honored their family's legacy by establishing the Nilie and Rose Richardson Family Scholarship.

The annual award supports an OFA graduate pursuing teaching, nursing, engineering, or business,

fields that reflect the values Nilie and Rose championed: service, practical skills, and contributing to a stronger community.

Rose and Nilie's lives were powerful testaments to perseverance. Rose left school at 14 to help raise her 11 younger siblings. After raising five children of her own — and often holding two jobs — she earned her GED and later an associate degree. She spent many evenings at the kitchen table helping her children with homework, instilling the discipline and confidence that would carry them through life. Her work as a nurse's aide at the St. Lawrence State Hospital reflected her compassion and resilience.

Nilie left school after ninth grade to run the family's 300-acre dairy farm in Macomb following his father's passing. A skilled farmer, conservationist, and problem-solver, he embraced modern practices long before they were common. When the farm was sold, he went on to work as a heavy equipment operator on the building of the St. Lawrence Seaway. His love for the natural world would inspire Curtis to a career in applied ecology at Duke University.

Rose and Nilie's story is one of grit, sacrifice, and unwavering belief in education as a path to possibility. Through this new scholarship, their children are ensuring that belief continues to open doors for OFA students for generations to come.

MARY M. McDONALD MASCOTT 1944-2025

ary M. McDonald Mascott cared deeply for her family, community, and the North Country. An accomplished attorney who spent most of her career with Merck & Co., Inc., she never forgot her roots in Northern New York. Mary supported many local and regional causes while sharing her leadership with a wide range of organizations throughout her life of 80 years, including the Community Foundation. She served on the Foundation's Board from 2002 to 2009 and was instrumental in its growth and development as a steadfast advocate for its important role. She brought insight and wisdom in extraordinary ways. A Watertown native, Mary was born in 1944, a daughter to Anna M. (Murrock) and J. Donald McDonald. She graduated from Immaculate Heart Academy in 1962 and earned a bachelor's



degree from D'Youville College, Buffalo, and a Juris Doctor from the Fordham University School of Law. She married **G. Theodore "Ted" Mascott** in 1983. Mary began her career practicing public service law in New York City for five years with the Legal Aid Society and the City Bar Association. Mary concluded her career at Merck as General Counsel, the first woman to hold that position in a major American corporation. We share our heartfelt sympathy as we mourn her loss and celebrate her life and legacy. Foundation grant helps health center strengthen long-term sustainability

This year, the Foundation awarded \$25,000 to support a comprehensive review of the Health Center's revenue cycle management — a behind-thescenes but mission-critical system that keeps the doors open and services accessible. As the Health Center continues to expand to meet rising community needs, the investment arrived at exactly the right moment.

Since becoming a Federally Qualified Health Center, the organization has tripled its budget and grown its workforce to serve more patients than ever. The Center expects to care for nearly 400 people each day across five clinical sites in Jefferson and Lewis counties. It also provides medical, dental, and behavioral health care in school-based centers across seven districts.

Unlike many health care providers, the Health Center cannot raise

fees to balance rising costs. At the same time, reimbursement challenges have grown more complex, especially following an unexpected cyberattack that disrupted key financial operations.

The Community Foundation grant enabled the Center to engage top healthcare financial experts to analyze workflows, improve processes, and strengthen systems that support accurate reimbursement and long-term sustainability.

"This investment will strengthen our financial stability and operational efficiency for years to come," said Joey Marie Horton, chief executive officer. "Funding not only helped us recover from an unexpected cyberattack that significantly impacted our operations, but also empowered us to build a stronger, more resilient organization."

The Community Foundation is a longtime Health Center supporter and partner. It played a key role in the organization's 2013 restructuring, including helping establish a permanent endowment at the Foundation, a fund designed to anchor the Center's future.

For this latest effort, the **Jane Deline Foundation** joined the Community Foundation with a \$25,000 matching grant, doubling the impact and ensuring the Center could complete this mission-essential project.

Community Foundation support helps Salvation Army replace critical van

Second grant award sustains Thanksgiving holiday meal tradition

\$15,000 Community
Foundation grant is
helping the Salvation
Army Watertown Corps
replace its aging 12-passenger
van — a vehicle the team has
relied on for more than a decade to run essential programs
across Jefferson County.

The van is central to nearly everything the Corps does: stocking its food pantry and soup kitchen, delivering winter shelter supplies, supporting disaster-relief efforts, transporting youth to camps and programs, and moving donated toys and holiday gifts. But after years of heavy use, the vehicle is no longer safe, requiring constant repairs. A new van will cost about \$70,000, and the Foundation's support helps close the remaining funding gap.

"We provide many different services, the overwhelming majority of which require transportation," **Capt. Josh Morales** said. "Whether it's picking up food donations, driving



children to camp, or picking up toys or bell-ringers, none of what we do can happen without a 12-passenger van. This grant helps us maintain staff and passenger safety. The new van will allow us to continue to effectively serve our community and put more money into our pantry and lunch programs."

The need is clear. In the last five years, the Salvation Army in Watertown has emerged as a steady resource for residents facing hardship. Each Thursday, 300 to

400 people rely on its free food-giveaway program. More than 200 others receive regular food support. During the holidays, assistance reaches more than 300 families and 3,000 children.

The Foundation also recently awarded a \$4,000 grant to ensure the Corps could serve its annual Thanksgiving meal, after learning the organization had lost its lead turkey sponsor. The funding will cover the

full cost of the main entrée. Last year, more than 1,200 individuals received a Thanksgiving meal at the State Street facility.

"The Salvation Army thanks the Community Foundation so much for providing support to make our annual Thanksgiving Day meal possible," Capt. Morales said. "With growing financial hardships we expect that number will be far exceeded. The Foundation has helped us feed the hungry in a very tangible way. For that, we say thank you."

More than \$130,000 awarded to aid tri-county food pantries

ince last December, the Community Foundation has awarded more than \$130,000 in grant support to assist food pantries, soup kitchens and school-based backpack programs in Jefferson, Lewis and St. Lawrence counties.

The grants were distributed to strengthen each organization and initiative, stocking shelves and serving families with essential needs. Local food pantries and soup kitchens continue to play a critical role in addressing food insecurity concerns across the region. School-based backpack programs provide nutritious options that help support disadvantaged children of all ages.

More than **50 locations** have received funding over the past year. Most support has been
